After a leisurely Saturday breakfast, you will participate in the annual business meeting of AAUW-NYS: hearing about the accomplishments of the past year, asking any questions you may have, and electing officers for the next two year terms. The meeting will be followed first by a presentation by Dot McLane, National Association Director at Large, and then by District Caucuses, thus touching on all levels of AAUW beyond the branches. At the Awards Luncheon branches will be recognized for their achievements during the year and we will hear an LAF speaker.

The Saturday workshops will feature historically significant individuals and groups in the progress of women in New York State.
