### Sister-to-Sister AAUW Family Day, Maria Ellis, Dr. Chigurupati Rani, Co-Chairs

The Sister-to-Sister AAUW Family Day was an inter-branch project, sponsored by New York City, Manhattan, Westchester and Rockland County Branches at Madison Square Garden, September 14, 2008. The day included a talk by President and General Manager, New York Liberty women's Basketball Team, Carol Blazejowski who spoke at 2:15 p.m.; free refreshments, and game at 4 p.m. between the NYC Liberty Team and The Detroit Shocks. AAUW members, BMCC students and families attended. This project/event showed parents, particularly the fathers, that it is okay to be involved with sports. The parents came to understand that when girls are involved in sports, they become more effective leaders because they as a team have a common goal, working together to achieve the team goal. They also learned that there are lots of supporting jobs for a basketball team, not just as a basketball player. As for PR, just imagine the American Association of University Women in fourteen foot letters on the Madison Square Garden marquee in New York City for all to see!

## Explore Your Opportunities – The Sky's the Limit!, Lorrin Johnson and Wilma Gitchell, Co-Directors

The goal of this program is to give 7th grade girls and opportunity to see and interact with "real STEM" professionals: to excite them about math, science, engineering and technology. Also to give interested parents an opportunity to meet with professional educators, counselors and financial aid people to guide them through the process of education for their daughters through high school and college; to inform them of alternative sources of financing such as non-profits whose goals are to educate and promote girls in those fields. It is a one day conference with continued back-up information on our website www.aauw-eyoconference.com. The conference is held in March at Barnard College and the 2008 conference hosted 166 girls and 54 parents. This is the fifth year (date: March 15, 2008; March 14, 2009 is the sixth) of a very successful conference. The keynote speaker was Dr. Ray Ann Havasy, Ph.D. who was a consultant to Steven Spielberg on his film "Jurassic Park." Each 7th grade girl was preregistered for two of the 15 one-hour hands-on work shops led by women professionals. Concurrently, the parents and educators had a town hall meeting and a workshop, "Show me the money." During the conference everyone participated in Mystery Woman Game. There were 15 professional women who wore straw hats and the goal of the game was identify them by their biographies in "The Mystery Woman" booklet. A prize was given for the participant who got all 15 signatures. This conference is coordinated by volunteers and all the professionals volunteer their time. There is a \$10 charge for participants. The local New York City community has been supportive by discounting materials and food for the conference. (Specifically, Famiglia Pizza, and Ivy League Stationary Store). 


