Schenectady Branch Project, Brightening the Future of the Students in the Schenectady Community, is atti-faceted and was generated when AAUW released its Spring/Summer 2008 report on educational equity, where the Girls Are." The study cites evidence that disparity in educational opportunity is based, not on gender, but on economic status and race/ethnicity. Our primary goal this past year had been to become more visible in the community, but since 74% of the Schenectady City students fall below the poverty level and many are so-called minorities, our focus changed. We decided to make visibility a secondary goal. It was more important to have an impact on the children in our community.

Our first step was to work in conjunction with the Schenectady Junior League in a project to provide backpacks and school supplies for the elementary children in the Schenectady Schools. In addition to collecting money and materials, we also helped to fill the backpacks and distribute them directly to the students on opening day. (See *Visions* articles and AAUW acknowledgement that was put into thousands of backpacks.)

With funding in schools so restricted, another component of the project was to provide the students with live theater. (See attachments,) We received grant money from Stewart's and the Schenectady County Initiative to sponsor performances from TheaterworksUSA to nearly 900 students.

We also created a mentoring program in three of the elementary schools. We planned what would be involved with the Reading Teacher and/or volunteer coordinator in each of the buildings. There are ten of us who mentor in grades 1-5 once a week for an hour. Each one-hour period is divided into two sessions, and in each one, the mentor works with one or two students at a time in the areas of reading and/or math. We have been mentoring since early Nov., plan to continue until June, and hopefully will extend this program to next year. Some of our members have also volunteered to go to one of the schools to read aloud to the children on Dr. Seuss Day on March 5.

When we first began at one of the schools, which was created as a result of a charter school closing, we found the library to be devoid of books and the classrooms lacking in materials. Jumping at the chance to help rectify this situation, we began a book drive. We contacted Friends of the Library, a volunteer group that monitors used books no longer in use in the public libraries, and they permitted us to choose 200 from their collection to take to the school. Coupled with the 250 new or gently worn books our AAUW members contributed, we donated a grand total of 450 books to this school, some going to the library and others directly into the classrooms.

On March 18, we are having a luncheon forum in which local administrators, including the Superintendent of the Schenectady Schools, will address the economic and racial/ethnic disparity they feel exists in their schools. With looming budget cuts that will no doubt impact ability to retain teacher-student ratio and programs, this issue of educational equity is a matter of great concern. We have invited a reporter from the *Gazette*, Schenectady's primary newspaper, to attend the discussion and hope this will result in a feature article.

One of our other related projects addresses the older student. For the first time, we have created a scholarship for a female student at Schenectady Community College, and one of the criteria will be financial need.

Did we increase our visibility? Absolutely! Working with Stewart's, Schenectady County Initiatives, the Junior League, Friends of the Library, the teachers, and the administrators in local districts, people now know our name and what we can accomplish. The names and numbers of AAUW members directly involved in these activities are found in the attached *Visions'* articles. Are we able to provide specific numbers of how many people we worked with or how many children were affected? No. Did we generate some new members? Sadly, no. Did we have a measurable impact on the community? Without a doubt, we have improved the learning opportunities of many of the students. Next year, we are considering the possibility of extending our mentoring to include young women who also have learning opportunities curtailed due to economic status and race/ethnicity, perhaps partnering with Literacy Volunteers. We have made a difference this year!



Dear Friends of the Library:

A few months ago I sent a letter to the principals of three Schenectady elementary schools asking if they would be interested in having teams of AAUW mentary work with children in need. One of the teams, of which I am a member, was assigned to Keane Elementary, formerly St. Luke's on Albany Street. This school was acquired by the district in response to the closing of the charter school.

Although the effort and enthusiasm for beginning the year on the right foot were evident, we saw a disheartening lack of materials when we visited. This is probably due to the fact that three new schools had to be added and there was a great increase in enrollment resulting in very large class sizes at the beginning of the school year. Funds were limited. Those of us who are former teachers were especially saddened by the lack of books available in the school library. The shelves were bare with the exception of a few, very few, books. We were told that children in the younger grades were being walked down to the Duane Street Branch to sign out books. There were obviously not any to sign out at the school library.

I mentioned this situation to my Branch beard of AALI Men. New. 7. The very next day, I received word that one of them, Dottie Potchnik, had contacted Ellie Rowland, who in turn contacted the President of Friends of the Library. On Wednesday, November 12, I was informed that we had been granted permission to choose 200 books to take to the Keane Library. Dottie and I met on the morning of the 13th. She boxed while I chose the books. I then delivered them, along with my own personal donation of an additional 166 books that I had purchased at the Book Barn, Whitney's Book Corner, Saratoga Library, and two Craigslist sites this past week.

I want you to know that the Keane staff and children are delighted to be filling their bookshelves with your generous donation. I have been told by the Remedial Reading teacher that the children want to thank you so don't be surprised if you receive some letters from them shortly.

On behalf of the members of AUW who are working very hard to overcome disparity of educational opportunity based upon economic status and race/ethnicity, we want to applied you for your willingness to support projects such as these. Your continued commitment to our community represents the gold standard for the rest of the organizations and volunteers in the area. Thank you so very much.
