Enhancing the Education of Children in Schenectady.

Last year, for the first time, our Branch made a concerted effort to perform community service and we focused on the children in the Schenectady Schools. Since our efforts proved to be very successful from a number of perspectives, we continued with this theme this year. However, our plan changed to enriching the learning experience of the child beyond the purely academic.

In June we participated in the Kids' Arts Festival in downtown Schenectady. There, community groups sponsored a craft or art activity for over 200 children. We plan to do this again in June. In addition to being a heart-warming experience to see children in a no-charge event in which they would be unlikely to participate, the visibility for AAUW is wonderful. (We wore our aprons labeled with "AAUW Schenectady" on them.)

Our Branch also continues to mentor once a week from Nov.-June in reading and math at the elementary level, and some of our members volunteered to read aloud in *Reading Across America*. AAUW has been invited to speak at a PTO forum in April to discuss a district-wide mentoring program in the Schenectady Schools. We will be able to share our experience with mentoring these past two years with the other organizations that will be in attendance. This showcases the service work of our Branch.

We have a history of securing grants to partially fund a live theatre performance for over 900 students. However, due to the fact that this fall's performance generated a substantial profit of \$725, we decided to apply this to contract with *The Puppet People* for a puppet play for first and second graders at two elementary schools at no cost to them. These are children who are unable to be bused to see the Nov. musical.

For the older children, we sent a donation to cover the cost of lunch for a table of ten girls, and we had representatives from out Branch helping to plan and execute the Working Group on Girls' "Girls Day Out." This was a program in which 150 troubled Middle School Girls had a chance to identify problems they face and how to deal with them. They were also given opportunity to build self-confidence, be both productive and creative, and attend follow-up sessions later in the year.

We also presented an award to a high school senior girl last June for the first time, and we will continue to do this again. We earmark a percentage of the proceeds from our fundraisers to a community project, and we will make sure some of that is set aside to recognize a worthy girl each year.

Did we fulfill our goals? Yes. What did we accomplish? We certainly enhanced the children's lives by supplementing their academic experiences in a variety of ways. Did our Branch and its members benefit too? Yes. We have substantially increased our partnerships with other groups in the community this past year, and we definitely have become more visible. Some of the child-related activities were the ones that actually enticed some women to join AAUW this year.

What have we learned? Although it oftentimes takes more time and work to reach out beyond Branch activities that benefit only us, the hands-on effort is well worth it. Having an impact on the children in a community where they frequently struggle is a goal to which we should all aspire!

Enclosed please find 2 copies of our contract for one performance of THE LAST DRAGON on April 15, 2010. Please sign the contracts, retaining one copy for your records and return the other to us along with directions. We will need 2 HOURS to set-up and 1½ HOURS to breakdown our show. So, we will need complete access to the performance area a full 2 hours prior to and after the show. Please make sure any before school, after school or during school programs (ie. YMCA, wrestling, basketball, volleyball, gym class, chorus, music, orchestra, band, drama, PT/OT or Speech) are notified of our presence so they can adjust their schedules.

We will need:

- 15 ft long x 15 ft deep x 10 ft high of unobstructed space to set-up our stage.
 We can set up on any level surface, a stage is not necessary.
