Sister to Sister Summit, an AAUW initiative, got rural middle school girls together to address mental, emotional, social and physical fitness issues and gave them a chance to visit the local community college. Information packets sent to the schools as well as press releases, letter to editor and thank you ad provided visibility for our branch's signature event.

The Fulton-Montgomery Community College and schools were contacted to avoid conflicts. The 17 middle schools in Hamilton, Fulton and Montgomery Counties were invited to bring 15 girls each. Districts provided transportation and chaperones.

Local organizations provided workshop facilitators free. An \$8 registration fee covered lunch. Donations and grants covered facility use, speaker fee, t-shirts etc. Reality Check and Project Action provided displays and give aways. A tour of the new FMCC nanotech clean room was organized for chaperones. Our AAUW information table generated interest.

Deborah Borie, speaker at the 2010 NY State AAUW convention, presented the cap-note on how media and advertisers work hard at influencing the decisions young people make. Borie also presented at our May AAUW meeting on "Too Sexy to Soon" which we opened to other women's organizations in the Elizabeth Cady Stanton Women's Consortium.

In planning our upcoming Summit to held on May 22, we considered the economic difficulties local school districts are having. We will focus on Tech Savvy to encourage girls in STEM careers and help schools who have had to cut teachers and programs offer opportunities to their girls. Using a computer program for the first time at S2S 12 to sort 190 girls into their three top choices of the thirteen workshops saved time and effort and it will be used for Summit 13!
