On the evening of Thursday, March 8 (5:30-8:30 pm), the Greater Rochester Area Branch of the American Association of University Women (GRAB AAUW) and the United Nations Association of Rochester (UNAR) celebrated International Women's Day 2012 at the Perkins Mansion, 494 East Avenue. This year's theme was "Connecting Women and Girls—Inspiring Futures."

It has been shown that wearing nice dresses is an important deterrent to traffickers. The Rochester Chapter of the Links is collecting items to assemble in survival kits for girls who attend the Latham Mission Foundation Schools. These kits contain feminine hygiene supplies, so girls will not have to miss school each month. Donations of feminine hygiene projects, lingerie and new panties are requested.

The diversity team, headed by **Heidi Parreño**, prepared an array of delicious dishes representative of a variety of countries around the world for the buffet.
