# **AAUW Westchester Branch Individual Program Award**

# **Category: Education**

Our program, Running and Winning, advances the AAUW mission of equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research. The workshop will educate high school girls about the barriers that women encounter when they run for and serve in elected office. They will also learn how they can advocate for equal opportunity for women and girls, just as we are advocating for the student attendees by participating in the planning and presentation of the workshop. The sponsors, the volunteers, and the elected officials are all volunteering their time, the YWCA is contributing space and the LWV and AAUW are covering costs so that the workshop is free for the girls. The concept is based on research that indicates women are underrepresented in all levels of elected office. In 2011 there were only 6 women governors.

Each Westchester high school can choose two girls to attend. The workshop will allow the girls to interact with elected officials in small groups in a friendly environment. With a facilitator they will plan a campaign, analyze issues, prepare publicity and write and deliver a campaign speech. Our goal is to strengthen the girls' self-confidence and leadership skills. We hope that their experience will convince them that a career in public office is possible. Taking what they learn from the workshop back to their schools, they may want to run for class office or membership in the student government.

Action steps in planning included writing a plan for a workshop, obtaining partners, gathering lists of elected women, and Westchester High Schools, writing and sending invitations, inviting a keynote speaker, developing a budget, registering students and elected officials, seeking and training facilitators.

Visibility will be gained through the 35 high schools, the girls, their families and friends, the elected officials, the volunteers, and the LWV and the AAUW members. There will also be attempts for media coverage on the day of the workshop. Impact on the community will be seen when the girls return to their high schools with their new skills and want to run for office or take a greater role in school government. Input from the schools will be felt if they want the workshop repeated next year. Elected officials will want to volunteer again if they feel the workshop is successful and the impact is worthwhile. A wrap up meeting and evaluations will give us feedback as to what has been a success and what needs to be improved.
