Venue: High School, College or Public Library

Procedure: Contact local high schools and colleges in the fall to determine Faculty Advisors for the Student Government and Classes. After the elections, ask the advisors the names of girls holding office. Invite them, their advisors, aspiring female candidates, social studies and political science classes, to come to the forum. Contact women in government, both elected and appointed, should be asked to participate in this panel at that time. Suggested questions: What motivated you to seek this position? What personal satisfaction is involved.? What support would you need to continue? (A branch committee met later to develop questions. See the following page for the results.)

Part of the idea is to find why women do and do not run for office. What makes it happen and how can we support them.
