

1	Any individual or institution who supports the pumose and mission of AAUW may become a member of AAUW.	Members must be a graduate with an associate or equivalent degree from a qualified educational institution.	If a person supports education and equity for women and girls, she or he should be allowed to join the organization. As a cause-based organization, the effectiveness of AAUW comes from the members' commitment to and passion for its mission, not from any qualifications the members may have.	1. Women with and without a college degree will be able to work together to address inequity. 2. Education will remain a core value of programs, grants, and scholarships. 3. Membership in AAUW may motivate non-degree holders to get their degree or inspire members to mentor them in getting their degree.	1. It would be a departure from AAUW's long-standing history. 2.
