Have you called, written or e-mailed any of your representatives in the past two months for any reason?

Great!! Good for you! Many members of NYS AAUW joined our ranks because they wanted a base for activism on issues we care about. If you haven't contacted anyone, think about doing it soon. I would suggest selecting one issue that you are deeply concerned about and watching what is going on with that particular topic. When action is needed you may be notified by your branch Public Policy contact. At that point it does not matter if you call, write or e-mail a specific person in Albany or Washington. All methods of communication are equally weighted.

Here are some issues in NYS you might want to watch: Redistricting, Pay Equity, Women's Health and Wellness, Dignity for All Students, NYS Retirement System, Education, International Human Rights, Voting Procedures in NYS, Appointments to Federal Courts, Election Process Reform, Energy Issues, or the Environment.

To watch the issue you may want to select, you have several options: our website,

www.northnet.org/nysaaaw, the national organization's website, www.aauw.org, newspapers or news from other media sources. The websites even tell you how to write letters.

Go to it women of NYS AAUW! Make sure your congressmen, assemblymen, and senators know how you stand on issues that affect you and those you love! Become an activist before it is too late.
