NY Votes to Keep Degree Requirement

Delegates to the AAUW New York State convention in Lake Placid defeated a resolution that would have urged the association to open AAUW membership to all individuals who share our goals. A second resolution to open membership to women and men with two-year college degrees was also defeated. That same weekend Maine AAUW, at their state convention, voted to eliminate the degree requirement for membership. Maine's resolution may be brought to the 2003 AAUW national convention in Rhode Island.

Seventeen branches increased membership in 2001 (see list on page 2). Contact these branches or see our state website for some of their secrets to growing your branch. Seven NY branches have applied for and received funding for membership projects. Request the *New York Membership Campaign* handout to help your branch plan its own membership campaign. State funds, up to \$75 per branch, are available for your project.

The Association is continuing its three membership initiatives that can be very helpful to your branch. The Shape the Future Campaign offers discounts to people who join at your public meetings and bonus memberships to the branches. The AAUW Emerging Leaders Internship Program provides step-by-step details and a poster/job description you can post on a college bulletin board to help you find a college student(s) to work with your branch. The Association will waive dues for up to three undergraduate student interns per branch. The Give a Grad a Gift program is even easier. Any member can give a FREE 12-month AAUW membership to a recent college or university graduate at no cost to you.

Mid-summer is not too early to begin turning our attention to the elections in November. Our Voter Education efforts go a long way toward AAUW's missions by educating the public on pivotal issues, involving women in the political process, heightening our visibility within our communities and drawing in new members. Further, it is an opportunity to develop new leaders and new leadership skills.

There are many ways to get involved without getting overwhelmed.

- Hold issue forums, including Women's Summits on Social Security Reform, an issue education program.
- Organize letter-writing campaigns to members of Congress and editors of local and national media outlets.
- Mail and distribute AAUW's informative, nonpartisan voter guide.
- Hold public candidate forums.
- Organize phone banks to contact women and encourage them to vote.
- Use partnerships with diverse organizations to inform a broad cross-section of women on the issues at stake.

There are **MANY** resources to use to get these programs off the ground. You do not need to go this alone or "recreate the wheel". The Association website, www.aauw.org/5000/vec.html, has a wealth of information through:

- Get the Facts alerts, to share with colleagues and friends and disseminate in your community (there's a program right there!)
- Action Alert, AAUW's monthly public policy newsletter (\$20/year)
- Two-minute Activist, to e-mail Congress
- Position papers on AAUW priority issues
- Voting records for your members of Congress
- AAUW Public Policy Program in English and in Spanish

There are step-by-step guides for **SMALL GROUPS** to help in planning a Candidate Forum, Voter Guide Research, and Voter Guide Distribution.

Thanks to the support of many AAUW-NYS branches and individuals, women in Turkey, Sierra Leone, and the Cameroon are benefiting from projects developed by our IFUW sisters in these countries. The Bina Roy Projects in Development provides funds for literacy, nutrition information, women's and children's health, skill training, money management and other needed programs.

This year New York State AAUW has doubled its 2000-2001 contribution to over \$1700, which meets our goal of 50 cents per member. Fifty cents is such a small amount to us and a large amount in many other countries. Half of the money contributed, over \$865, was raised at the AAUW-NYS Convention at Lake Placid, thanks to the brilliant idea of Jane Smith, our Public Policy Director. Not only did she organize and advertise the Bina Roy Lap Swim, but she swam and raised the most pledge money.

Branch Action Notes

The **Yates County** Branch AAUW just received from AAUW the Gold Level of Achievement in the *Twenty First Century Recognition* program for their digital videotaping project called "Through the Eyes of Women". Noted local women were interviewed and videotaped. These tapes and CDs are to be shared with the entire community through the local historical society.

The Amsterdam-Gloversville-Johnstown Branch has completed its third successful *Sister-to-Sister Summit*. The branch participated in a Heritage Faire in Johnstown, in coalition with the Mohawk Pathways Girl Scouts Council and BPW. Members conducted a booth (open to the public) with puzzles, word search, and other materials about Women's Rights Movements and the area's contribution to it, especially the role of Johnstown native Elizabeth Cady Stanton. Also, they provided special "design-your-quilt-square" materials for the benefit of the attending Troops.

For Women's History Month, the **Jefferson County** Branch invited Col. Jeanette James, Fort Drum Meddac Commander, who showed a video celebrating the 100-year anniversary of the Army Nurse Corps. Col. James is just one of nine Commanders worldwide who are from the Nursing Corps. Nurses have only recently been allowed to assume command positions, despite their advanced military and educational training. This barrier has now been removed and nurses such as Col. James who have advanced degrees and attended the Army War College are making history. Women from Ft. Drum have joined our branch and that certainly adds to our diversity in many ways.

The **Chautauqua-Westfield** Branch honored twenty-one 8th grade girls in three area public schools for their outstanding accomplishment (grades of at least 90%) in their math and science courses. Each girl was presented with a framed certificate, congratulatory letters were sent to their parents, and their school libraries were presented with a copy of *A to Z of Women in Science and Math* by Lisa Yount.

Nine young women in their junior year in high school were honored for winning a **Huntington** Branch Excellence In Science Award. Members of the Awards Committee presented the gift certificates to the winners in their schools. At our Installation dinner special recognition was given to Doris Lessuck, for her 53 years of dedication to the mission of AAUW in the Huntington area and to four of our new members who attended.

Dear AAUW NY Friends, Thank you for the wonderful party in Austin. It was perfect, and the icing on the cake was the announcement that over \$2500 had been contributed to the Legal Advocacy Fund in my name. A special thank you to the more than 60 individuals and branches in New York that made this generous gift possible.
