Voter Education/Public Policy Challenge in NYS!

For those of you who did not make it to Delta Lake, the NYS Board and Leadership Conference in July, you missed a lot of great information and a really good time! On Saturday morning Betsy Forkas and I addressed the group to talk about the Voter Education and Public Policy challenge for this program year. We stayed up late Friday night working on the presentation, making sure we had some laughs and doing our best to make it clear what is being asked of branches. Based on the feedback we got, I believe we accomplished our goal.

In a nutshell, branches are being asked to focus on making an impact in their communities through their voter education and public policy programs. The programs themselves should aim to educate voters and get them to the polls. After the election, the work is not over. Branches need to follow-up with their elected officials and look at the fallout of their actions or non-actions on the American Association of University Women's priority issues.



During our breakout session there was some conversation about the difficulty for some branches in working with other branches within their congressional districts. This type of coalition is desired, but certainly not a requirement. Branches should, however, make sure to work with at least one or two other organizations to maximize the impact of their programs.

We also announced a "little" incentive - \$150. The state board will give \$25 to the best voter registration program, \$25 to the best voter education program, \$25 to the best Get Out The Vote (GOTV) program, \$25 for the best public policy (follow-up) program, and \$50 for the best overall program. It is possible for one branch to get the entire \$150 if each component and the overall program are all truly exceptional.

In addition, the state is budgeting \$20 per congressional district for branches to work together on voter education and public policy. I have receive some calls for ideas and suggestions for getting started. I urge you, if you branch has not outlined its voter education and public policy program for the year, please let me know. I am here to help!

The crisp bright days of autumn bring with them an excitement that stirs us. We American Association of University Women members know that part of the excitement is generated by the "Sharing the Vision" programs your branch has developed. Your participation in these activities, like the "Get Out The Vote" Campaign, will make a difference in this crucial election year.

AAUW of New York State has lost only 27 members in the last year. Congratulations everyone! Let's aim for a membership gain of one or more members per branch.

Unfortunately, membership nationwide is down. This has resulted in a loss of income. To prevent an anticipated one million dollar deficit this year, the AAUW board has instituted cost saving measures. They have reduced staff, eliminated programs, and requested a reduction of the 2005 dues paid to the International Federation of University Women.

Nancy Rustad, AAUW President, has begun a year long "One in a Million" Campaign to secure AAUW's future. Members, especially the 11,000 Life Members nationwide, are being asked to contribute \$120. If you donate, you will receive an "Equity is Still an Issue" pin and the knowledge that you helped.

We are the AAUW, a national organization of 100,000 members strong in our dedication to our mission. Without the national organization, we do not exist.

Changing the requirements for membership was discussed at the 2003 Association Convention. The AAUW board was charged to find out what members thought about a change. To achieve this goal, the AAUW Membership Committee has requested that each branch have an open ended discussion with its members. The results are to be sent back to the Association on the report form by November 15.

The future of AAUW NYS is in our hands.



As we become an "online" society, it is important to realize that the change to electronic methods is beneficial! Visit the AAUW website to find information about Fellowships and Grants, and applications that can be downloaded. Nearly every grant winner found the source online, or was directed there by a friend. Since most applicants are in the 20 – 40 age group, they are discovering AAUW through electronic media.

This November the new Fellows and Grant Recipients will be published online only. We will no longer print a bound booklet for reference. In previous years, a brief description of each project, the name, address, and photo of the recipient were available. Due to privacy regulations, the last booklet contained only names, pictures, and project summaries. To contact a Fellow to be a speaker at your branch, check the aauw.org web site for the latest information.

The Foundation Board voted at its May meeting to implement several other changes. The Named Units program has been discontinued. Developed many years ago as a holding place for funds until a grant or fellowship could be completed at the \$35,000 or \$100,000 level, many Named Units were started and never completed, languishing for years. This happened to a NYS Unit honoring Dr. Persia Campbell, an economist at Syracuse University. We found by researching through google.com that she was the author of several books, including "Consumer Representation in the New Deal." A Consumer Counsel to Governor Averell Harriman, she is remembered as a forerunner for consumer advocacy and a role model for activists in her field. This year the Named Unit honoring her will be well used to support a Community Action Grant in New York.

As you work in your branch to raise funds for EF, remember to publicize all the possibilities and good results of our donations. Our goal is \$25 per capita for every branch. Write your check now! We are improving women's lives, one female at a time, and that gives us our vitality. We are living the mission and sharing the vision!



International Day of Peace





Please take note of two very special days coming up this fall. The first is "The International Day of Peace" on September 21, 2004. This special day provides an opportunity

The **Mohawk Valley Branch** will accept the American Association of University Women -New York State 2004 Voter Education & Public Policy Challenge in September when they invite

the public to a local library to view and discuss the video "Iron Jawed Angels". They will set up a month-long AAUW-MVB display in another local library and team with the League of Women Voters to increase voter registration in the area and to scout for prospective members. In October, Mary Chapin will speak on the book, *Women At Ground Zero*, with local women police, firefighter and EMT participation. Again, the public will be invited to membership and to "Share the Vision". Diversity will be a strong focus as this year's newly appointed Chair Janet Garza will help us connect to the Liberian population through the local refugee center.

The fall is a busy season for **North Shore Branch** which began with "One Woman's View", a report from their President and International Delegate, Catherine Moore, on the 2004 International Federation of University Women's Conference in Perth. With a calendar theme of "Purpose, Power, Progress", they will sponsor a health conference, voter registration drive, public policy forum breakfast, celebrate art and literacy achievements of women, and raise funds for EF with basket raffles at an "Autumn Leaves" luncheon. They welcomed two new members and encouraged

them to participate in some of their 10 active interest groups.

Leading to Reading is a community project sponsored by the **Poughkeepsie Branch**. Members have partnered with the Community Family Development Day Care Center that serves 275 children from low and moderate-income families. The branch organized book collections, received several grants for books and beanbag chairs, enlisted a church men's group to build classroom bookcases, and coordinated community resources. The project gave a tremendous boost to the day care center's early literacy program.

The Equity in Education action group of AAUW's **Westchester Branch** held its first meeting of the year at the Border's Café in Mt. Kisco. Interested new members were invited to sign up to join the group at their first general meeting earlier in September to be part of the coming year's exciting projects. They will continue with Hispanic Outreach at the College of Westchester (formerly The Westchester Business Institute) and seek new college liaisons through a letter outreach to all other Westchester colleges, public and private. Other projects include tutoring the students at CW in English and math during the school day, tutoring students at the Ann M. Dormer Middle School in Ossining after school hours, and continuing their annual Women's History Month Essay Contest for all Westchester high school students, grades 9-12.
